Chairman's Report

Commenting on her 'Annus Horribilis' in 1992, Her Majesty the Queen said it was "not a year on which I shall look back with undiluted pleasure". While I have not had anything like the problems the Queen suffered I do have similar feelings as I look back on my year as Chairman. Following in the very experienced footsteps of the late Alf Murphy was not the easiest of tasks and threats to our parish have arisen in the past 12 months which we had not envisioned a year ago.

We had thought that the parish was fairly safe from unwelcome development until at least 2025 but the expansionist plans of Milton Keynes have put that in doubt by the publication of "Plan:MK" which contains one option suggesting that they might cross the M1 into Central Bedfordshire. As you probably know, Hulcote & Salford PC has joined with the neighbouring parishes of Cranfield, Aspley Guise, Ridgmont, Husborne Crawley and Brogborough to send a robust objection to any such plan which would change the nature of these parishes for the worse and forever. As the Borough of Milton Keynes has so much rural land within its own borders it seems totally unreasonable that it should seek to expand into the rural space of another authority. We are told that it cannot do so without the agreement of Central Beds Council, which is, however, obliged to cooperate with neighbouring authorities. I am confident that no such agreement will ever be willingly given by CBC. But, and it's a big but, there are always government inspectors lurking in the background who can approve planning applications without reference to local feelings. So much for Local Government! I may be overly optimistic but my gut feeling is that we shall be OK. However, I'll feel more confident when CBC finally gets its own Local Plan approved by the inspectors.

Some of you may have seen the short piece I wrote entitled 'Cannon to the East of Us, Cannon to the West' which was tucked away in a recent edition of the Cranfield Express. This concerned the dual threat of Plan: MK on the one side and that of the proposed Winterwood logistics site on the other. Personally I am horrified about this latter threat and what it could do to Hulcote and Salford. Even more so because it might well get approval from CBC on this occasion in spite of their throwing it out in the past. The thought of a million square feet of warehouses towering up to 60 feet above this greenfield site is not a pleasant one to contemplate. Quite apart from the aesthetic damage it will cause, the effect on peak hour traffic through our villages will be truly horrendous. We are assured that it will all come from the M1 or A421 but you can bet your bottom dollar it won't. Even if it does it will have to make a right turn across Salford Road and require a new roundabout to do it. If such a development were allowed it should, at the very least, have a dedicated road leading off the A421. Should this most unwelcome scheme ever get approval we can envisage a vast and ever-growing warehouse site which stretches from Fen Farm and the John Lewis warehouses and encompassing Amazon - and possibly a new rail terminal - to turn Junction 13 and its environs into a transport and logistics hub with few equals in the UK.

All this is a little way (or, hopefully a very long way) off in the future. Right now I am concerned, as we all are, about the HGV traffic coming illegally through Salford. This is no new problem but I believe it is being made worse by the fact that there are no warning signs at the start of the diverted Broughton Road where it joins the Newport Pagnell road opposite Countess Way. This means that unwary HGV drivers following the signs to Salford will drive over a mile before they see the first prohibition sign just on our side of the motorway bridge - by which time they may be very reluctant to turn back. They may even find it almost impossible, as did the driver of a huge vehicle I met recently which was towing an equally huge trailer. I gestured to him that he was about to break the law but he just threw up his hands to say 'how am I supposed to turn this beast round in such a narrow road'. I did have some sympathy with him. I've contacted Cllr. Tombe of CBC who has beenin touch with the relevant MKB officers. They have now said they will provide the necessary signage within their patch.

Another problem on the horizon is the closure of Cranfield Road at the M1 to allow a new bridge to be built that will span both the M1 and the soon-to-be dualled A421. Obviously this will be a necessary if unwelcome requirement. The alarming aspect is the proposal to close the road during an 18 month period. The Parish Council will do all it can to stress the huge inconvenience this will cause to our residents and to limit the actual closure to an absolute minimum.

Although I shall, with considerable relief, be handing over to a new chairman at the Annual Parish Council meeting on the 9th May I can look back with some satisfaction on the past twelve months.

Although not a very interesting achievement we are now endeavouring to ensure that some of the legally required elements of local government are back in place. Things like **Standing Orders** and **Policies** are not going to get anyone wildly excited but they are needed for the proper conduct of business. I dare say that these existed in the past but we could

A melodious young woman, Danni Nichols started the evening off, singing her songs for an hour of most enjoyable music. It was also a fund-raiser for MacMillan Nurses and I hear that a sum of around £800 was raised! I am sure that the villages Spring Lunch on 17th April will be just as successful! [It was - Ed]

Another event in the hall for local people also began in April – an art morning for those so inclined. It was and is, a most easy-going group who bring along their own materials and ideas and can draw or paint whilst chatting over coffee and cake, which proved a very pleasant morning. And we shall shortly have a new, experienced and competent Parish Clerk confirmed in position so I am sure she will keep us up to the mark in such matters.

One thing that gives me great pleasure is that I now feel the Parish Council and the Village Hall Committee are really able to work together in a way that has not always happened in the past. I sincerely congratulate the Committee on the way that it has organised so many opportunities for our residents to come together and build a community spirit and identity for this parish and I am confident the Parish Council will support it in every way possible in the future.

I'm also looking forward to seeing a new notice board on the Mary Agate Hall for the use of both the PC and the Hall Committee. It's quite a small thing in itself but the current one is so shabby and difficult to maintain that it really doesn't reflect well on the village. We've approved money (quite a lot of money) for a new one so hopefully it will not be too long before the old one is replaced.

Incidentally, rate payers will possibly have noticed that the Parish precept has been reduced slightly this year. We put it up last year to ensure that we had sufficient funds to pay for the council elections last May, which we had expected to cost several thousand pounds. In the event they didn't so there seemed no reason not to return to the previous level. Every little helps, especially as the CBC rate has had to go up this year after being frozen for the last few.

Finally, on behalf of everyone may I say a fond *au revoir* (certainly not *adieu*) to Len and Sally Wisson who along with their three sons have been the backbone of our community for many years and supported the two villages in so many ways. Fortunately they will not be moving far so I'm sure they will be returning time and time again. They can always feel assured of a warm welcome.

ur celebrations of Easter are over, with thoughts and plans already turning towards Pentecost; and those of the Archbishops of Canterbury and York already have. Their desire, their 'great longing' is to see a wave of prayer in

Church of England and 'many other churches' between 8th and 15th May, ending at Pentecost.

THY KINGDOM COM

In their letter to every parish priest the Archbishops write: "At the heart of our prayers will be words that

Jesus himself taught us — 'Thy kingdom come, thy will be done.' It is impossible to overstate the life-transforming power of the Lord's Prayer. It is a prayer that is reassuring enough to be on the lips of the dying and yet dangerous enough to be banned in cinemas. It is famous enough to be spoken each day by billions in hundreds of languages



and yet intimate enough to draw us ever closer into friendship with Jesus Christ. It is simple enough to be memorised by small children and yet profound enough to sustain a whole lifetime of prayer. When we pray it with sincerity and with joy, there is no imagining the

new ways in which God can use us to his glory."

Resources for churches of all traditions to take part are being made available on www.thykingdom.co.uk. In the video accompanying the launch of the initiative, Archbishop Justin speaks of his hope that the wave of prayer can change the way that the church reaches out to the communities around us and the way that we serve and love them. The hope is that through concerted prayer, people will discover new confidence in sharing their faith.

on May 15th at Hulcote or Salford all are warmly invited to celebrate Pentecost at the open air ecumenical service to be held on the green in Court Road at Cranfield.
